## What does it take?

### Dear God's people,

We have just completed our focus on stewardship and throughout the month we were attempting to better understand what it means to be a steward if we acknowledge that God is the owner of all that we have, see and are and that we as stewards are entrusted with all that belongs to God. Before we renewed our commitment to God, as disciples commissioned to make disciples, we reflected on the commended offering and God's preferred desire.

Working through the readings myself these past few weeks got me thinking a lot more of my personal response to God as a steward. But something more has happened through this process because I have become more acutely aware of the status of my relationship with God and that there is much to be desired if I am to honestly fulfil my call as a steward of the many blessings I am privileged to enjoy each new day.

In addition to the readings I have also been meditating on the life and ministry of Billy and Ruth Graham. I've spent the last month reading and reflecting the teaching of the on Scriptures, comparing my life and ministry as a priest with the life of one of the world's most renowned evangelist and pondering my own spirituality. I was particularly attracted to one chapter that seemed to push me to dig really deep in my reflection and meditation. The challenge was not only in

my ability as a priest in the Church of God but in my personal spirituality from which I need to resource for mv ordained ministry. It was the difficult challenge of moving away from performing a task to building a honest relationship with God. Each page of that chapter seemed to highlight somethina different that needed some attention and focus. It reawakened within me the promise I made three decades ago that God may arant me the awareness and strength to serve God with humility, simply and faithfully. I was overwhelmed by God's mercy and patience with me when the reality dawned of how often I may not operate as I had promised and how the focus on the task had robbed me of being merciful, compassionate and loving.

Billy Graham speaks of the Christian duty of humility. I often find myself praying that God should make me humble. But Graham explains that humility is not a gift from God. Being humble is a duty towards God in response to the generous outpouring of God's abundant love and mercy. For him humility is not merely a state of being lesser than another person but an attitude we must strive for when we take account of all that God does for us or how God cradles and protect us when we find ourselves in the place the Psalmist calls the "Valley of death". Reaching that place of humility means that it, like everything else, has to be a goal towards which we

must strive. In his letter to the Corinthians St Paul writes about the athlete's preparation for the Like athlete race. an determined to win a race Christians must work hard at achieving the goal. The 'hard work' requires discipline. The more intense and thorough our preparation the greater the chance reaching our goal. The key to achieving the goal of humility is by being disciplined.

Hanspeter Nuesch, author of the book, Ruth and Billy Graham writes, "Discipline has to do with setting priorities and the value we attribute to something. The reason for a lack of discipline often lies in the fact that we won't place enough value on something." He asserts, "... Christians shouldn't be strangers to discipline when we consider that that word discipline has the same root as the word disciple. A good student follows his teacher's instruction carefully. The Holy Spirit is our teacher, or, as the disciple John says, our parakletos: someone who has been called (kletos) to stand by our side (para) and to show us the way." But it was the words, 'placing enough value' that resonated with me. I began thinking of what it is that God requires of me as God's child and how that should inform and shape my call as a priest in the Church of God. My discipleship and call should then become my goal and I must keep it in the fore of my mind like a neon flashing light drawing attention to something. In my case it would be my desire to be in one of the rooms that Jesus had gone to prepare for those who believe in God.

I have come to realise that for me to be a faithful and humble follower of Jesus Christ I need to make a conscious commitment to do so. This is despite the commitment I made at my confirmation and that I make at the end of each Eucharistic service. I recognized that I need to do it daily as a constant reminder of my intentions to be a follower of Jesus.

So if that is what I wish to achieve I need to be disciplined because that is what my response to God will require. I have to deliberately take the necessary steps seeking what God requires of me as a person through the reading of the Bible, praying for the guidance to make the right decisions, submitting to the power of the Holy Spirit and in the struggle of wanting to do my thing as opposed to doing what God requires of me I will need to discipline myself.

It is in my commitment as a steward seeking a better relationship with God to live out the great commandment in my life daily. I know that it will be my constant challenge not to love myself more than God or to put myself before the needs of my neighbour. In pursuit of this which has as its humility foundation and faithfulness I will have to up the level of my prayers to constantly seek God's face and be assured of God's guidance. And when I fail, which I am bound to do, I will confidently fall on my bended knees knowing God's grace and forgiveness and muster more courage to carry on until I next fall.

I thank God for the journey through this past season of stewardship and for God's guidance in helping me see which areas in my life need attention. I pray that you and I, as God's sons and daughters, may diligently fulfil the promises we made this time so that all we are and in all we do may the God of Heaven be glorified.

And may the promise of Scripture that God will bless and multiply all our efforts be God's blessing to us through our commitment to God.
